Having analysed the current projects, with the requested up to £1m

anticipates that c. 20 30 more projects can be supported, many of which are currently unable to meet supplier quotes. This will allow a further up to 2,000 premises worth c. £2m to benefit from ultrafast connectivity despite being not in any of the current deployment plans.

Reinvestment of the funding as described above allows for the greatest amount of flexibility considering the current telecommunications market and increasing Government Connectivity

Alternative Options Considered And Rejected	Not to reinvest: g a proportionate percentage of underspend/reinvestment (36% in respect of contract) back to BDUK (expected to be in excess of \pounds 1.4m); noting that following the end of the Superfast Worcestershire deployments, there remain significant number of Worcestershire premises without acceptable service (c. 8,000 premises without at least a superfast service). Note that the funding to support the PMO,
	the team are not funded through core WCC revenue budgets, therefore without the reinvestment would cease to exist.
	To delay the reinvestment decision: by delaying the reinvestment decision, we risk up to 50 communities (up to 5,000 premises) either not getting gigabit connectivity at all or having their gigabit upgrade delayed until 2025 or beyond. It is crucial to understand that some of these communities fall into the worst served across Worcestershire, many of which have been following the programme's progress since 2012, expecting at least some improvement well before now.
